

### The Bible is the Word of God

- II Timothy 3:16-17
- Hebrews 1:1-2
- II Peter 1:20-21

### God inspired men

- Written over a period of 1600 years
- Written by at least 40 men
- Written by men living on 3 continents
- Written in three different languages
  - $\circ$  Hebrew
  - o Aramaic
  - o Greek

# Sixty-Six Books selected by God – Canonization

- The process by which the books of the Bible came together into one authoritative volume
- Old Testament
  - o Thirty-nine books
- New Testament
  - Twenty-seven books
- Sixty-six books total

### Survival of the Bible

- King Jehoiakim of Judah
  - $\circ$  Jeremiah 36
- Antiochus Epiphany of Greece
  - o 175-164 BC
- Diocletian of Rome AD 284-305
  - Order all Bibles destroyed
  - Christians died, instead of surrendering the Bible
  - Extincto Nomine Christianorum "extinct is the name of Christian"
- Voltaire (AD 1694-1778)
  - Within a century the Bible would be forgotten
- Robert Ingersoll (AD 1833-1899)
  - Within fifteen years, I will have this book in the morgue.

# Popularity of the Bible

- First book printed by Gutenberg in 1456
- As of 1985, 7,111,665,848 Bibles were distributed by the United Bible Society
- In 1970, Edgar Mitchell deposited a complete RSV Bible on the surface of the moon!

# Lesson 2 - Ancient Words

### Two types of ancient documents

- Autographs
- Originals actually penned by the author
- Manuscripts
- Copies of the autographs
- Abbreviated MS; plural MSS

#### Autographs written on

- Leather
- Parchment hair removed and rubbed smooth
- Vellum lamb skin used for best books
- Papyrus (Jeremiah 36)

# Autographs were written in three different languages

- Hebrew
- Aramaic
- Greek

### **Ancient documents**

- Earliest form
  - Scrolls
- Later forms
  - Codex
  - o Book form

### **Earliest existing Old Testament manuscript**

- Nash Papyrus
  - Single sheet containing the ten commandments dating to 100 BC
  - o Discovered in 1898
- Dead Sea Scrolls
  - $\circ$  Discovered in 1947
  - Fragments of 140 MSS dating back to 250 BC
  - o Fragments of all the Old Testament except Esther
- Silver Amulet
  - o Discovered in 1986
  - Priestly benediction of Numbers 6:24-26
  - o Dates to the seventh century BC

### **Earliest existing New Testament manuscripts**

- Seventy-six papyrus MSS dating to the second and third century with almost all the New Testament represented.
- St. John's Fragment
  - Discovered in 1986
  - Written on both sides
  - John 18:31-33 on one side 37-38 on other
  - Dates to AD 117
- Codex Sinaiticus
  - Discovered in 1844
  - Uncial MSS
  - Script using only capital letters
  - o Old and New Testaments
  - Dates to AD 340
- Codex Vaticanus
  - o Discovered in 1886
  - Uncial MSS
  - Written on 759 leaves of vellum
  - o Old and New Testaments
  - $\circ~$  Dates to AD 350

# The Word can be trusted

- Dead Sea Scrolls proved the OT text had not been altered in 1000 years of hand copying!
- Huge amounts of manuscripts are available to reconstruct the NT texts
- 5000+ Greek MSS
- 11,000+ NT MSS in other languages
- 36,289 Quotations in Church Fathers
- 2000+ Lectionaries collections of Scripture verses

Ancient Versions of the Bible

- Septuagint (OT only) LXX
  - o Greek translation
  - Dates to around 250 BC
  - Prepared in Alexandria, Egypt
  - o NT writers often quoted the Septuagint version of the Bible
- Vulgate (V)
  - o Latin translation
  - Dates to around 350 BC
  - Prepared by Jerome
  - Most used Bible from AD 400-AD 1400

# **First Complete English Translation**

- John Wycliffe (1330-1384)
  - From the Latin
  - Completed NT in 1380 and the OT in 1382
  - 170 copies exist today
  - Very expensive project handwritten
  - Printing press invented AFTER Wycliffe (1450)

# **First Complete English Version**

- William Tyndale (1484-1536)
  - From the original languages
  - Completed NT in 1525
  - One known copy exists today British Museum
  - 80% of King James Version is Tyndale
  - Created a desire for the Bible

# **First Catholic English Version**

- Douay Version (1611)
- Translated by Gregory Martin
- Translation of the Latin Vulgate
- Catholic doctrine is reflected

# **Great Britain's English Version**

- King James Version (1611)
- Authorized to be created by King James I in 1604
- Translated from original languages
- Seven years of translation by 54 scholars
- Contained the books of the Apocrypha

# Bible is organized by

- Chapters
  - o Stephen Langton, Archbishop of Canterbury, 13th Century
- Verses
  - Robert Stephens, 1545; Robert Estienne, 1551, Greek text

# **Locating Bible Verses**

- Concordance
  - A book containing the words of Scripture in alphabetical order with their contexts and a description by chapter and verses of the places in which they can be found
  - History of the use of the concordance
    - Began to appear around 1230 under the guidance of Hugo de Saint-Cher for the Latin Vulgate
    - Concordance for the English Bible
      - Alexander Cruden (1550) "Father of the English Bible Concordance"
  - Using the concordance
    - Locate Bible Verses
      - Find verses by key words
      - Find supporting scriptures
      - Assemble biographical information
    - How many time a word appears
      - In the entire Bible
      - In a particular book
      - In a particular section
      - In a particular chapter
      - By a particular author
    - Defining a word
      - The best way to define a biblical word is to note how it is used in context
      - Example: Luke 14:26 the word "hate" should be studied as it is used throughout the Bible.
    - Telling the differences between words
      - Example: John 21:15-17 The word "love" represents several Hebrew and Greek words. A concordance differentiates between the same English words

  - Robert Young, Analytical Concordance (1879)
    - Every English word is organized under the various Hebrew and Greek words
  - James Strong, Strong's Exhaustive Concordance (1890)
    - Every English word is organized in alphabetical order with "Strong's number" which corresponds to a Hebrew and Greek dictionary

### **Interpreting the Bible**

- Hermeneutics
  - The branch of knowledge that deals with interpretation, especially of the Bible or literary texts

# Questions needed to be asked

- Who is speaking?
- To whom is the passage speaking?
- When and where was the passage written?
- In what form is the passage written?
- What do the words mean?
- Under what dispensation were the words written?

- What do other passages of Scripture say on the same subject?
- What does this passage teach me about God and His Son?
- What have great Christian scholars said about this passage?

  - Textural notes variations in manuscripts
  - Philological notes meaning of words
  - Grammatical notes meaning of sentences
  - Structural notes connection of ideas
  - Historical notes contemporary events
  - Geographical notes weather, topography
  - $\circ~$  Archaeological notes sheds light on culture
  - Theological notes parallel passages
  - Popular notes devotional, homiletical

# Old Testament

- 39 Books by 32+ authors
- Written over a period of 1000 years (1400-400 BC)
- Covers at least 3600 years (4000-400 BC)
- OT is 77% of the Bible
- 929 Chapters
- 23,214 Verses

# **Old Testament – Christ-link**

- The coming of the Messiah (Christ) is the story of the Bible in three chapters
  - Chapter 1 (OT) Christ is Coming
  - Chapter 2 (NT Gospels) Christ is Here
  - Chapter 3 (Rest of NT) Christ is Coming Again

# **Old Testament – Organization**

- Books of the Law 5 Books
  - Hebrew word "torah" means "law"
  - Pentateuch means "five scrolls"
  - Authorship Moses
  - Pentateuch claims this; OT agrees; Jesus and the apostles confirm it.
  - Christ-link Foundation for Christ
  - Lays the foundation in four ways
    - Promises (Genesis 12:2-3)
    - Prefigurements (temple rituals and festivals
    - Precepts (Law of Moses)
    - Prophecies (Genesis 49:10; Deuteronomy 18:15)
- Historical Books 12 Books
  - Authorship Some are anonymous
  - Jewish tradition is eight authors
    - Joshua, Samuel, Gad, Nathan, Jeremiah, Ezra, Nehemiah, Mordecai
  - Christ-link Preparation for Christ
  - Four Major Emphasis in the historical books
    - Kingship God is faithful to His promise to David
    - Prophets God's messengers preach repentance
    - Temple God's earthly dwelling place
    - Worship God's standards

  - Authorship Many, some being anonymous
  - o Job traditionally written by Moses
  - Psalms various authors; 73 by David
  - Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, Song of Solomon by Solomon, and various authors in Proverbs
  - o Christ-link Anticipation of Christ
  - Poetry books focus on
    - Personal interests vs. national interests
    - Experiences vs. historical
    - Human race vs. Hebrew race
    - Poetry vs. prose
- Prophets 17 Books
  - Two main divisions
    - Major Prophets 5 Books
    - Minor Prophets 12 Books
  - Christ-link Expectation of Christ
  - Books of the Prophets focus on
    - National issues that arise in Northern and Southern kingdoms
    - Judgment of other nations
    - Prophecies about the coming Messiah

- God reveals His will to man
- OT teaches man about his beginnings
- OT answers some of life's tough questions
- Genesis teaches the beginning of God's redemption
- Impossible to understand the NT without the OT
- OT is a tutor to the NT Christians (Galatians 3:24)

- Key Text: Exodus 19:4-6
- Christ-link: The Passover Lamb

### Leviticus

- Name: Greek pertaining to the Levites
- Content Summary: Sacrifices and Sanctity
- Basic Lesson: Holiness is Essential
- Chronology: From Construction to Census
- Key Text: Leviticus 19:2
- Christ-link: The Perfect Priest

### Numbers

- Name: Two censuses taken
- Content Summary: Marching and Murmuring
- Basic Lesson: Perseverance is Essential
- Chronology: From Census at Sinai to Commands
- Key Text: Numbers 14:29-30
- Christ-link: The Star and the Scepter (24:17)

### Deuteronomy

- Name: Greek second law
- Content Summary: Preaching and Pleading
- Basic Lesson: Obedience is Essential
- Chronology: From Moses' first address to his death
- Key Text: Deuteronomy 10:12-13
- Christ-link: The Prophet like unto Moses (18:15)

- Duration is uncertain
- Major Events
  - $\circ$  Creation
  - The fall in the Garden of Eden
  - $\circ~$  Cain and Abel
  - $\circ~$  Preparation for the flood
- Major characters
  - o Adam & Eve
  - o Noah
- Major Revelations
  - $\circ~$  Study of Origins
  - Expect a Messiah (Genesis 3:15)
  - $\circ~$  The dignity of man and the equality of woman
  - $\circ$   $\,$  The importance of marriage  $\,$
  - $\circ$   $\,$  The existence and work of Satan

# Postdiluvian (After the flood) Period

- Genesis 9-11
- Duration is uncertain
- Major Events
  - o Exiting the Ark
  - Confusion of the Languages
- Major character
  - o Noah
- Major Revelations
  - God's faithfulness displayed through a rainbow
  - o Laws concerning murder
  - God to dwell in the tents of Shem

# Patriarchal Period


- Genesis 12-46
- Duration 215 years (2092-1877 BC)
- Major Events
  - Journey of the Patriarchs
  - Destruction of Sodom
  - o Birth of Isaac
  - o Birth of Jacob's Children
    - Leah Reuben, Simeon, Levi, Judah, Issachar, Zebulon, and Dinah
    - Bilhah (Rachel's maid) Dan and Naphtali
    - Zilpah (Leah's maid) Gad and Asher
    - Rachel Joseph and Benjamin
- Major characters
  - $\circ~$  Abraham and Sarah
  - Isaac and Rebekah
  - Jacob and Leah and Rachel
- Major Revelations
  - Covenant to Abraham (Genesis 12)
  - Melchizedek (Genesis 14)
  - Sign of circumcision (Genesis 17)
  - Sacrifice of Isaac (Genesis 22)
  - Dreams of Joseph (Genesis 41)

# **Egyptian Period**

- Genesis 47-50 & Exodus 1-15
- Duration is 430 years (1877-1447 BC)
- Major Events
  - Joseph saves Egypt and his people
  - Servitude under a new Pharaoh (Exodus 1)
  - Moses leads Israel out of bondage
- Major characters
  - Joseph (in Genesis)
  - Moses (in Exodus)
- Major Revelations
  - Jacob's prediction of Shiloh (Genesis 49:10)
  - Moses and the burning bush (Exodus 3-4)
  - Passover (Exodus 12)
  - Crossing of the Red Sea (Exodus 14)

# Wilderness Period

- Exodus 16-40, Leviticus, Numbers and Deuteronomy
- Duration is 40 years (1447-1407 BC)
- Major Events
  - God provides food and water (Exodus 16)
  - God gives the Law at Sinai (Exodus 20)
  - The golden calf (Exodus 32)
  - The tabernacle (Exodus 35-40)
  - The report of the 12 spies (Numbers 13)
  - Korah rebellion (Numbers 16)
  - The bronze serpent (Numbers 21)
  - Defeat of Sihon and Og (Numbers 21)
  - Death of Moses (Deuteronomy 34)
- Major characters
  - o Moses
  - $\circ$  Aaron
  - o Miriam
- Major Revelations
  - o The Law of Moses
  - Worship centered at the tabernacle
  - Balaam's prophecy of the Star and the Scepter (Numbers 24:17)
  - Moses' prophecy of future prophet (Deuteronomy 18)
  - Moses' prophecy of Israel's captivity and restoration (Deuteronomy 28-30)



- Chronology: Death of Joshua to death of Samson
- Key Text: Judges 2:19
- Christ-link: The Ultimate Deliverer

### Ruth

- Originally appendix to Judges
- Content Summary: Spotlight on a godly family
- Basic Lesson: Inclusion of God's grace
- Chronology: Famine to a family
- Key Text: Ruth 1:16
- Christ-link: Our Kinsman-Redeemer

### **Conquest Period**

- Joshua, Judges 1-2, 17-21
- Duration is 40 years (1407 1367 BC)



- Performed miracles on the Sabbath five times
- Filled with compassion six times
- Filled with amazement two times
- Groaned during one miracle (Mark 7:34-35)
- Wept during one miracle (John 11:43-44)
